Caring and Compassion

ARCA provides lifelong services for children and adults with developmental disabilities, but what is that special spark; what makes ARCA a source of hope, a place of comfort, a family? Faylene Wytewa-Alire has been on a quest to better define just what makes ARCA tick. Here is what she found.

People work at ARCA because they have compassion for the people in ARCA's care. We are here because we want to help people with developmental disabilities lead great lives. The belief in our mission of working together to open doors for people with developmental disabilities to be valued members of the community is evident throughout all divisions of ARCA. This is true whether you have worked here a few months or 30+ years.

Glenda Tate and Gail Manning, ARCA nurses, believe ARCA is like an extended family and there is a feeling of being appreciated by everyone, especially the individuals in our care. Gail has been with ARCA for 31 years and her daughter has lived in an ARCA home for 20 years. "There is a feeling of camaraderie throughout the agency," she says. "You are part of a team and being part of a team makes you want to do your best."

Direct support professionals (DSPs) are the lifeline of ARCA and Gail knows her daughter will be taken care of long after she and her husband are gone. "I am lucky to know first hand, the pride staff takes in caring for our daughter and the opportunities they help create for her to be part of our community."

Staff makes meaningful memories for individuals in ARCA's care. Lives are celebrated. Recently an individual's birthday party was almost cancelled because of his failing health, but staff moved forward so he would know how much he was loved before his health worsened.

Staff has memories, too, both happy and painful. Glenda reminisced about an individual she worked with who kept telling her to bring her car to the garage where he worked. "I was new to ARCA and thought he worked at a service station." She later learned he liked to imitate his favorite TV characters – namely Goober from the Andy Griffith Show. She laughs, recalling "I was ready to take my car to his garage!"

Memories can be very painful when staff works through end of life issues. They become a counselor to family and housemates while dealing with their own grief. Sheri Quam, ARCA Home Supervisor for Supported Living, has been with ARCA for eight years and has had to deal with

the passing of several individuals. She credits her team with giving her strength.

ARCA's administrative staff doesn't always have the opportunity for daily interaction with individuals in our care. Special events like ARCA's Apple Mountain Camp give employees like Bernadette Yazzie and Jean Lovato, from ARCA's Finance Department, that opportunity. Every summer, Bernadette and Jean decorate for the dance at camp. Bernadette says "Meeting the people personalizes it for me, and I also get to be involved in an event that the individuals look forward to every year!"

Another benefit at ARCA is the opportunity to work in different areas of the company. For example Aaron Roth who has been with ARCA for 15 years, has worked in human resources, as a DSP in supported employment and in residential services. He has fond memories of being a literacy instructor. Now, he is a member of the IT Department. "I've found at ARCA that if your passion and interest change, opportunities will come your way," says Aaron.

There are staff who leave and later return to ARCA. Laura Leigh Barrett, who has worked a total of over 20 years in the nutrition department, says "When I left and came back Elaine Solimon, CEO at the time and Judith Parsons, HR Director welcomed me at the lobby with hugs! What other organization would do that for a returning employee. It made me feel special!"

So, not only does our staff have compassion for individuals in our care, but also for each other. ARCA is our extended family. So many who were interviewed reflected on their memories of team members and one person said it all "There is true heart at ARCA and that is why I stay!"

ARCA staff has a positive impact on individuals in our care everyday. Whether working as a DSP, in finance, nursing, nutrition, human resources, IT, the maintenance department or the other valuable divisions within ARCA, our goal is to improve their quality of life. We do so with pride and care!



My Story

In 1991, New Mexico became the first and only state in the Nation to fund a special project for persons with Prader-Willi Syndrome (PWS). Along with other serious issues, this rare and unique genetic disability causes people to be unable to stop eating. Antoinette Jojola, better known as AJ, was one of eight original people in the New Mexico PWS Project. She has been a delight to work with and has taught all of us about PWS and how best to support people who live with it everyday. Following is a talk she gave to our ARCA Foundation Board. She was wonderful!



My name is Antoinette Jojola. I'm from Isleta Pueblo. I have three sisters and I stay a lot with my oldest sister, Judy.

My Dad put me in a group home because he could not take care of me. It is hard to live in a group home.

I have PWS. It is an eating disorder. I cannot stop myself from eating. I don't know when my stomach is full. I'm on a special diet for my weight. If I eat too much I can die. My staff controls my meals. Everything is locked up at my group home.

It is hard to have PWS. Nobody understands.

I like the things I do. I do Special Olympics. I love to do ceramics, softball and Health and Wellness. I like to do arts and crafts. I like to go to my Feasts. (AJ is a member of the Isleta Pueblo and they have religious ceremonies called "feast days".)

With PWS all I see is food everywhere I go. Everything is food and more food. I wish people could understand me.
